**Profitability & Risk Management in Engineering Practice**

Engineers often feel that they are between a rock and a hard place when it comes to risk management and profitability. If they follow all of the risk management advice they are given – e.g., “only sign 100% insurable contracts,” “don’t do business with difficult clients,” “send CYA letters about everything” – they risk losing clients and projects. But engineers are also aware that one claim can have devastating impact on the firm’s profitability in the form of a (often quite large) deductible obligation, lost time, damage to reputation, and the like.

In this seminar we will explore how engineers can navigate the dangerous waters between sound risk management and profitability. We will provide practical advice about client and project selection, contract negotiation, and using documentation and communication to strengthen client relationships and reduce the likelihood of professional liability claims.

**Green Stormwater Infrastructure Design**

There is an increasing demand to implement Low Impact Development (LID) methods into roadway projects especially in the Pacific Northwest. Green infrastructure is the LID solution in stormwater management to help maintain the natural hydrological condition of the site.

Depending on the project funding source and location, local and federal agencies require green infrastructure facilities to be prioritized in stormwater management. Such engineered facilities are designed to provide treatment and detention as required and to reduce long term maintenance costs. However, there is always a challenge to find the right approach that fits both the project condition and regulations.

Challenges include high groundwater level, limited right of way, shallow existing stormwater system, low infiltration rate and limited funding.

This presentation discusses and compares regulations and challenges for implementing LID techniques in five transportation projects.

Additionally, green stormwater treatment and detention design methods, bioengineered slope protection techniques and how to minimize impacts of a new infrastructure on ecosystem will be discussed.

Selected projects include three Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) systems, two roadway widenings and one pedestrian trail design. Stakeholders for these projects are LTD, TriMet, ODOT, WFLHD, Washington County, and C-TRAN.

**PRESENTER**

**Hamed Hakimelahi, PE, WSP**, is a water resources engineer who specializes in hydrologic and hydraulic design and analysis of conveyance systems with emphasis on Low Impact Development (LID). Hamed's work also encompasses stream restoration, bioretention facility design, large and small diameter pipe asset management and rehabilitation. Hamed earned a master's degree from California State University of Long Beach and is a licensed Professional Engineer. He has worked for WSP (formerly Parsons Brinckerhoff) for 4 years.
